Lesson 1

Last week we began looking at finding quarters. We now know that when we split something into quarters, we are splitting it into four equal groups. Today we are going to be finding quarters of numbers.

You should use resources at home to help you, such as pencils, pasta, toys, or coins for example.

You need to:

- look at the number
- create the number using your resources
- share your number equally into 4 parts
- record the halved number



For example -

I have the number 8.
I am going to use cubes to represent this



I am now going to share my whole into two halves.





My whole is 8. A quarter of 8 is 4.



Diwali for Hindus



Diwali is 'the festival of lights'.

Diwali takes place over five days and is greatly enjoyed by children because of the lights, fireworks and sweets involved. Oil lamps, called divas, are lit to help the goddess of wealth and success, Lakshmi, find her way into people's homes.

Diwali celebrates one of the legends which tells of the return of Rama and Sita to Rama's kingdom. The festival celebrates the victory of good over evil and light over darkness.

The festival is a time for spring cleaning, new clothes and gifts. Divas are often floated across the river Ganges - it is regarded as good luck if the lamp travels all the way across.















Diwali for Sikhs

Diwali is really important as it celebrates the release from prison of the sixth guru, Guru Hargobind, and 52 other princes in 1619. They celebrate by lighting the Golden Temple and this tradition continues today.

Diwali is known as the 'festival of lights' because shops, public places and homes are decorated with small oil lamps called divas.

Fireworks are also a huge part of the Diwali celebrations, although some Sikhs prefer not to use them because of the noise pollution and potential dangers.

People get together to exchange gifts and it is also an opportunity to celebrate a successful harvest.
